Objective:

To help students develop a clear understanding of the Biblical account of Creation, and the primary Biblical and scientific evidence supporting a young earth and literal six-day Creation. To challenge them to think both Biblically and critically about the competing theories of Creation and give them the opportunity to research contemporary controversies over origins.

Description of Course Content:

This course will survey the Old and New Testaments and the textbook *The Early Earth (TEE)*. It consists of 10 classes to be completed over four months. Each class contains an ~45 minute lecture, followed by regular homework assignments as described in the course syllabus below. A portfolio of the student's completed assignments will be displayed at the Family Heritage ExpoTM, the first Saturday each May.

Methodology:

Students shall:

- Study the Biblical narrative and commentary about Creation and discuss differing interpretations of the Biblical narrative.
- Examine the competing theories of origins (Creation and Evolution) and the scientific evidence that supports or contradicts each theory.
- Study primary Scripture texts dealing with creation, with a specific focus on Genesis 1-3; John 1; Psalm 19; Romans 1, 10; Hebrews 11; 1Corinthians 1-2; and Job 38-42.
- Maintain a notebook of all assignments, containing;
 - o class notes that the student took while watching all lectures,
 - o an outline of each chapter of the text,
 - written essay assignments that demonstrate awareness of the Biblical principles reflected in each essay topic presented.

Course Schedule:

This course is offered once a year, during the Second Semester (February – May). Starting at Class 11, class dates and deadlines will follow the WCFS Credit Class schedule in the WCFS calendar (available on our website and upon request from the WCFS Office). Students will also receive an email from their instructor introducing the course and containing a list of all class dates for the current semester.

Grade Determination:

40% of the grade will be based on **attendance**, **notes** and **tests**. **60%** of the grade will be based on **Homework Assignments**.
